Happy New Year! Most of the activity at the Warner site in December surrounded the Hicks school. In fact, the school reached an important milestone last month. It passed the rough inspection that allows for restoration work to continue. The rough inspection had been a concern as the nearly 170 year old structure is hardly standard for what the county inspectors are accustomed to in new builds. In addition, since the original roof structure was removed for transport and then restored, an architect was required to do calculations and drawings. Luckily, Randy Klepinger, of Klepinger Construction was able to bridge the differences between 19th century and 21st century construction methods with his years of restoration experience while maintaining the historic character of the school. The next step is installation of insulation in the ceiling and other areas in preparation for the insulation inspection. We continued electrical work that included installation of many switches and outlets throughout the school.

The move and restoration of the Hicks school made the front page of the *Livingston Daily* newspaper in their feature, "Top Ten Stories of 2016".
